Clinical

Clinical care is the cornerstone of the department. We remain steadfast in our efforts to provide evidence-based gynecologic and obstetric care, including innovative programs aimed at addressing the major causes of maternal mortality and associated disparities. The hospital launched a \$35 million capital campaign to build a new labor and delivery unit, expected to open in 2025. This will provide a state-of-the-art facility for patient care. The Division of General ObGyn recruited several faculty members to address the growing needs for ObGyn services. The division recently opened a gynecologic specialties clinic for patients seeking minimally invasive gynecologic services and pediatric and adolescent gynecology. Our academic midwifery program has broadened its clinical coverage throughout the hospital, advancing medical education and research, advocating for patient-centered care, and serving as a safety net for our community.

Research

The department experienced a rapid growth in grant funding over the past 3

years. From a baseline of three major grants (2 UG1 network grants and 1 UO1 grant) awarded to departmental Principal Investigators (PIs) and a number of subawards, department PIs have received more than a dozen major grants over the past 3 years, in addition to several federal subawards, foundation grants and industry grants. This includes the renewal of **two national network grants**. The Program in Women's Oncology continues to be a national leader in clinical trials, currently the third leading enroller in GOG foundation clinical trials. In the early part of 2024, department PIs have already received an R01, a foundation grant and multiple subawards, while several applications are pending funding decisions.

- BEST Trial (PCORI, PI-Sung): Multicenter trial comparing beta-agonists to Botox injections in the bladder for the management of urgency urinary incontinence in women.
- COMPASS-PLUS (NIH R01NR021126, PI-Miller): Stepped-wedge hybrid type 2 implementation-effectiveness randomized trial to evaluate the effectiveness of the collaborative care model on mental health outcomes, and racial and ethnic health disparities.



Diversity, Equity and Inclusion



As a department, we strive to achieve diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI). Under the direction of our department DEI committee led by Drs. Carberry and Eger, we are committed to ensuring our patients receive equitable care, faculty and trainees work in an inclusive, supportive environment, and our community is engaged in the work we do.

Health Equity Highlights

- Postpartum Hypertension Equity Program: Launched with funding from Women and Infants Hospital and led by a dedicated Nurse Practitioner and Community Health Worker, this program provides blood pressure cuffs to all eligible patients prior to hospital discharge, train patients on blood pressure monitoring, recording, and when to seek medical attention, educate patients on how to maintain healthy blood pressure, and connect patients with a primary care provider. More than 1,300 patients were enrolled into the program over 12 months with an estimated 50% reduction in ED visits for postpartum hypertension.
- Women and Infants Hospital Equity in Childbirth and Health Outcomes Program
 (WIH ECHO): Funded by \$1 million grant from the CVS foundation to support the
 postpartum hypertension equity program, partner with the community to reduce bias
 and discrimination in maternity care especially among patients of color, and provide
 postpartum support in the community using a Mobile Van.
- Major Research Projects with Equity Focus: COMPASS-PLUS for equitable perinatal
 mental health care using the collaborative care model, and RICOMSS for a communitybased maternal support services to address social needs towards perinatal health
 equity. PCORI BEST DEI supplement supports community engagement efforts to address
 barriers to urinary incontinence care and research in underrepresented populations.
- Development of LGBTQ+ Service Line led by Dr. Beth Cronin:
 To develop a comprehensive, patient centered care specifically for LGBTQ+ patients.
- Ana Sofia Barber DeBrito, CNM, MSN, Emily S. Miller, MD, MPH, and Method Tuuli, MD, MPH, MBA were featured in the Rhode Island PBS series, "The Risk of Giving Birth."
 This is a documentary combining personal stories and interviews with medical professionals, politicians, and community activists to shed light on the impact of structural racism on Black mothers, the alarming rise in complications for Latina mothers and Rhode Island's efforts to improve outcomes. Ana Sofia Barber DeBrito, CNM, MSN won the American College of Nurse-Midwives Media Award for this work in 2024.
