Aiming to improve elder care through team-based learning



The Care New England health system, along with our CNEMG and Integra community care network, will be teaming up under the guidance of Phillip Clare, a professor at the University of Rhode Island, to help improve health services for older adults. 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The Providence Center's Jacqueline Mancini attends police workshop in Arlington, Virginia



As first responders, police officers are frequently the first criminal justice officials on the scene of traumatic events where they encounter victims, witnesses to violence, and children and family members exposed to violence. As a result, police officers may experience immediate, persistent, and/or delayed physiological and psychological effects and responses to traumatic exposure on a regular basis.

How law enforcement organizations identify and respond to trauma can go a long way in helping individuals, communities, and officers recover from such events, build resiliency, increase collaboration, and experience healthier outcomes.

The Providence Center's Jacqueline Mancini, manager of Emergency Services, recently attended a one-day workshop seminar in Arlington, Virginia which addressed these challenges.

The conference, hosted by The Bureau of Justice Assistance discussed topics related to trauma-informed policing. As the technical assistance provider for the strategic policing initiative (SPI) grant in Providence, Jackie and her team formed a collaboration between The Providence Center and The Providence Police Department which was aimed at reducing inappropriate police/EMS contact for the city's highest utilizers who have a contributing behavioral health problem.

Her team of clinicians and case managers were able to work with police to perform aggressive outreach and engagement for these targeted individuals with an objective to engage them in treatment and lead them on their journey toward recovery while alleviating the burden on public resources.

This workshop was an opportunity for Jackie to network and brainstorm with other SPI teams from across the countries that are doing similar work. It featured presentations by prominent experts and practitioners in policing, health care, and violence prevention, who have extensive experience and in-depth knowledge in trauma-informed care at individual and organizational levels.
